Cosmetology students **Yazmin Martinez**, **Maria Anguiano** and **Veronica Anguiano** shared their immigration stories with classmates and college leaders. It didn't matter that one never got to say goodbye to her friends or family. Or another couldn't speak English as well as her siblings. Or a third didn't even want to become an American. All that mattered was that the fathers they barely knew saw a better life for them in a foreign land and were determined to take them there. Now, a trio of cosmetology students says they're lucky to be where they are.

For four years, Anguiano's father had been talking about bringing his kids into the United States from central Mexico. When it finally happened, she was 13. "I started crying that day," she recalled. "We had to leave right away. I never say goodbye to my friends." And she's not alone. Martinez never had her dad with her during her youth and never got anything for Christmas, she said. Then, also at 13, she had to leave what she did have.

Anguiano's sister, Veronica, was 18 when she came with her father - against her will. "For months I cry and say I want to go back to Mexico," she said. And then she resisted learning in school. Years passed before she took intent to study cosmetology, prompted her sister. "I know it's very important to take every class," she said of college. "...It's not easy, but I know someday I'll talk very, very well English. Such are rare opportunities where they came from. "We're lucky to be here," she said - to the point of occasionally feeling guilty about the opportunities she has that others she grew up with don't. Fairmont

Minnesota West - Fairmont Center recently celebrated its 5 Year Anniversary in August, 2011 which is located at the Southern Minnesota Education Campus Building. This educational opportunity has brought higher education to the Fairmont and surrounding communities for both traditional and adult students. Enrollments have grown over the years with an anticipated enrollment for fall semester 2011 to be approximately 80-90 students. Students can earn their AA degree and be right on track to complete a bachelor degree by transferring to a Minnesota State College and University as well as other public and private four-year colleges. The Fairmont Center also offers courses in Business, Accounting, and, Administrative Assistant.

Redwood Falls

Redwood Falls woke up more than five years ago to the need to serve students wanting to pursue college. Among other reasons, jobs the city wanted to attract and hold depended on the availability of local training opportunities – classes a medical worker or a factory technician could take during a lunch hour or before work. The first thing companies would ask is, “Where are your higher education opportunities?” “said **Julie Rath** of the *Redwood Area Development Corporation*. “We kept hearing that we really could use more education out here,” said **Harry Davis**, a member of the leadership group which helped establish the Redwood Falls site. The county bought the former grocery store building in town and agreed to share some space with the learning center. A local bank, the city and Jackpot Junction kicked in \$25,000 each, Davis said.

They also can take technical classes in fields like farm management, automotive work and computer services. The key to it all was a high-quality Internet connection. “We could not exist if it were not for connectivity,” said **Michael Van Keulen**, campus coordinator at the center.

Customized Training

Minnesota West Community & Technical College was approved as a Hub College for *The Community College Citizen Preparedness Program (3CP2)* through FEMA and the *National Partnership for Environmental Technology Education*. **Matthew Loeslie** has been approved and will represent Minnesota West as one of the 125 national Community Colleges qualified to deliver the Citizen Preparedness Course with the goal of helping citizens preserve life and minimize injuries sustained in a disaster or local community crisis.

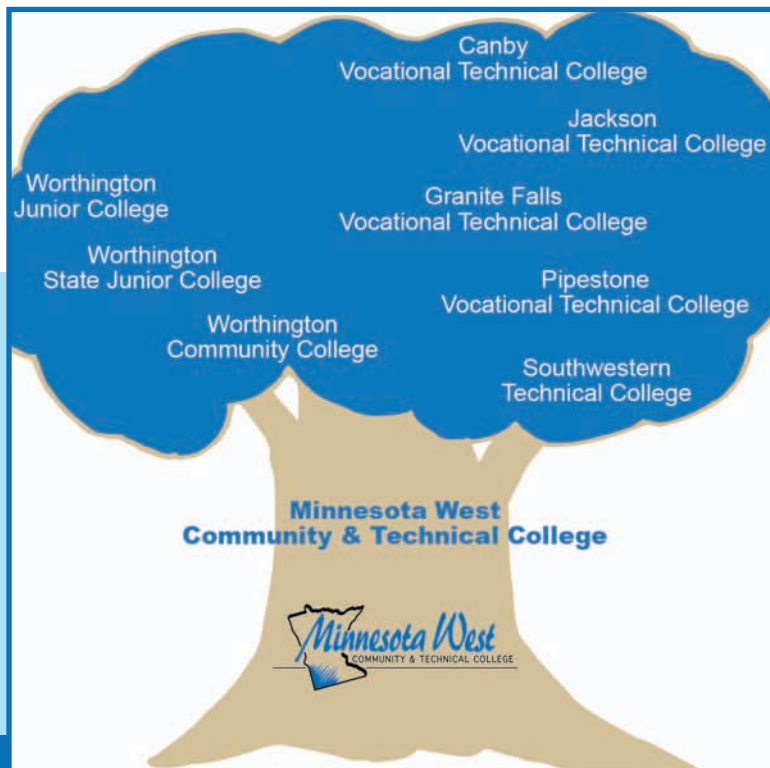

Ed Hansen

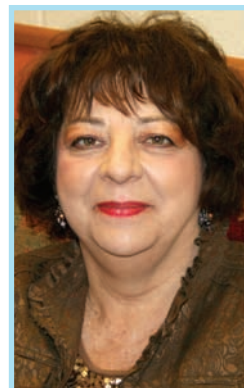

Aspen Institute Ranks Minnesota West as Top 120 Community Colleges

Aspen Institute Ranks Minnesota West as Top 120 Community Colleges

The Aspen Institute College Excellence Program released a list of the top 120 community colleges—from 32 states—, based on high standards for learning, completion rates, and training for competitive jobs. Minnesota West Community & Technical College in a comprehensive review of publicly available data has been recognized as demonstrating strong outcomes considering three top areas of student success which includes:

- Performance (retention, graduation rates including transfers, and degrees and certificates for full-time students);
- Improvement of completion performance over time; and
- Equity (institutional record for completion outcomes for disadvantaged students).

Of the country's 1,200 community colleges, Minnesota West Community & Technical College ranked in the top 10 percent. The Aspen College Excellence Program aims to identify and replicate campus-wide practices that significantly improve college student outcomes.

Telecommunication Certificate and Degree

Minnesota West Community and Technical College is pleased to announce the addition of a new 30 credit Telecommunications Technology Certificate and a 60 credit Telecommunications Technology AAS degree. Both programs will be offered online with some required on campus labs and tests. The Telecommunications Technology certificate and degree programs are a collaborative effort by the Minnesota Telecommunications Alliance, a consortium of telephone companies that serve the state, Minnesota West Community and Technical College and industry partners. Telecommunications carriers are expanding their data transmission capabilities, known as “bandwidth,” by replacing copper wires with fiber optic cables. According to Brent Christensen, president of the Minnesota Telecommunications Alliance, Telephone companies need to hire network technicians with training in the latest broadband technology. There is a shortage of an adequately trained workforce today and that trend will continue into the foreseeable future.

Luverne Center Recognized for Innovative Achievements

Minnesota State Colleges and Universities recognized Minnesota West Community & Technical College, Luverne Education Center for innovative achievement for their Health Careers. The process of selecting the top innovators began with nominations by presidents of system colleges and universities. Innovation is intentionally not further defined because the award is designed to broadly recognize and appreciation innovations of all types. A screening committee narrowed the submissions to the top contenders, which were presented to the board chair, who made the final selections.

Law Enforcement Program Receives Recertification

Minnesota West Community & Technical College is pleased to announce that the Minnesota Board of Peace Officer Standards and Training renewed the certification of the professional peace officer education program at Minnesota West for another five years. In order to become a peace officer in the State of Minnesota, every officer must obtain a minimum two-year degree and complete a “Skills” (police academy) component. The MN Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) Board oversees peace officers’ licenses and all colleges or universities who offer the required education components. Recently, Minnesota West Community and Technical College successfully completed a very extensive recertification process. The process included a site visit from a POST Board representative who reviewed all parts of the law enforcement program’s curriculum. The curriculum met the 154 different learning objectives, of both the program and the college on topics; such as diversity, sexual harassment, safety, discrimination, and student rights. In addition, the credentials of the instructors, graduation rates, and license test pass/fail ratios were reviewed. “I am glad this recertification has gone so well over the past nine months,” stated Mark Holden, Law Enforcement Coordinator.

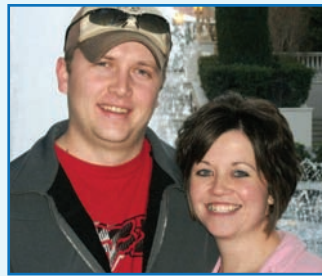

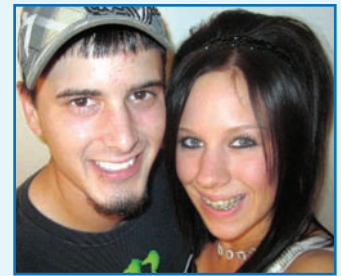
