Minnesota West Graduates Over 700 Students in May Ceremonies

Minnesota West Community and Technical College graduated a total of 737 students from the five campuses of the college.

The Canby Campus graduated fifty-one students in nine different program areas. The commencement speaker was Canby Mayor, **Gene Bies** while **Trevor Humphrey**, an electrician graduate, gave the student address.

The Granite Falls Campus graduated one hundred and thirty-three students in thirty-one different program areas. The commencement speaker was Granite Falls Mayor, **Dave Smiglewski** while **Jamie Olerud**, a graduate in receptionist, medical administrative secretary and medical coding specialist, gave the student address.

The Jackson Campus graduated one hundred and twenty-eight students in about fifteen different programs. The commencement

speaker was **Dr. Jeff Williamson**, Minnesota West Vice-President of Instruction, while **Adam LeClaire**, student senate president, spoke on behalf of the students.

The Pipestone Campus graduated one hundred and eleven students in twenty-seven different program areas. The commencement speaker was **Dr. Diane Graber**, Minnesota West Provost, while **Debbie Handberg**, a medical administrative secretary and medical coding specialist graduate from the Pipestone campus and **Tricia Scholtes**, a radiologic technology graduation from the Luverne site, gave the student address.

The Worthington Campus graduated three hundred and fourteen students in twenty-five different program areas. The commencement speaker was **Dr. Manuel Lopez**, Associate Vice Chancellor for the Minnesota State Colleges and Universities.

The student initially had to discuss what the finished product would look like, and then begin building the computers through ordering and assembling the computers as a group. **Micha Hooper**, PC program student, said "Early on we looked at parts and decided as a group what kind of computer we wanted to build. We needed to know what we wanted to do." When the parts came in, the class worked together to build the first computer, then they built computers individually. **Terri Pelzel**, Minnesota West computer instructor, said "The RAM is four times that of a normal machine and the speed is

2009 Graduate Spotlight

Reyad Saada – Worthington

Reyad Saada graduated with his associate of science in Human Services Generalist Track in May from the Worthington Campus of Minnesota West. Reyad is not a typical Minnesota West graduate however, while he did come to Minnesota West after graduating from Sioux Falls Washington High School, he came to the United States in 2004 at the age of 19. Reyad did not know any English, and he did not understand any of the American customs.

Reyad and his family moved to the United States after spending time in a refugee camp in Kenya, Africa after the family fled their home country of Ethiopia, Africa. Reyad lived in the refugee camp with his younger siblings for two years, while his parents lived in Sioux Falls, SD, trying to earn enough money to bring the family to the capital city.

After he and his two siblings moved to the United States, and graduated from high school in 2007 and found his way to Minnesota West after friends told him about the school. When Reyad visited the Worthington Campus he was impressed by how friendly the staff was, and how everyone seemed to be interested in helping Reyad become successful.

Reyad's plans include finishing his associate of arts degree over the summer at Minnesota West and transferring to Minnesota State University-Mankato to major in social work. Reyad said he wants to become a social worker because he received so much help and support from the nongovernmental organization (NGO) staff in the refugee camp and social workers after he arrived in this country that he wants to give back to others. The concept of giving back does not apply to just Reyad in his family, as his younger brother is a second year law enforcement student at Minnesota West.

Besides his school work, Reyad has worked in the LARC on the Worthington Campus and worked as an interpreter in the Worthington community because he speaks four languages, English, Amharic, Oromo and Swahili.

Reyad has strong feelings for Minnesota West because of the faculty and staff at the college. "They all want you to be somewhere," he says, and that they want you to learn so they are always available to help you. He said the faculty and staff were very helpful to him because they would listen to what he needed and helped him get what he needed to succeed.

Minnesota West Community and Technical College is pleased to announce that the Medical **Laboratory Technician Program** (MLT) is awarded Continuing **Accreditation** for seven years by the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences. The Medical Laboratory Technician (MLT) program at Minnesota West is designed to prepare students for employment in the medical, clinical, research and public health laboratories. A MLT collects and/ or receives patient specimens and performs general laboratory tests to aid physicians in the diagnosis and treatment of disease. The MLT program is located at the Luverne, MN center. The National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences (NAACLS) is the premier agency for accreditation and approval of educational programs in the clinical laboratory sciences and related healthcare disciplines.

Accreditation is a voluntary, self-regulatory process by which non-governmental associations recognize educational institutions or programs that have been found to meet or exceed standards and criteria for educational quality. This is the first step toward complete NLN accreditation. A final decision will be made by NLNAC on complete accreditation in the summer of 2009. If granted accreditation by NLNAC, all future as well as this spring's graduates of Minnesota West's Associate Degree Nursing program will benefit. Minnesota West's nursing programs are approved by the Minnesota State Board of Nursing and the Minnesota State Colleges and Universities Board of Trustees.
