Welcome & Introductions	Dawn welcomed attendees and shared her appreciation for serving on the advisory committee. The committee meets twice a year and the purpose of the Advisory Committee is to give insight and guidance to the program and to make sure that our nursing graduates are meeting the needs of our facilities. The October 2020 meeting was held via Zoom due to COVID restrictions. Dawn Gordon chaired the meeting. Introductions of members present were made.		
Approval of Fall 2019 Minutes	The Fall/October 2019 Minutes were approved by Laurie Jo Johansen/Nancy Ruth Leibold. The Spring meeting in April 2020 was canceled due to COVID.		
Election of an Advisory Committee Chair	Thank you to past chair, Kylie Turner who served for two years. Monica Van Otterloo, Murray County Medical Center, graciously agreed to accept the open chair position. Motion passed to accept Monica by Laurie Jo/Ruth V.		
Nursing Department Updates	The nursing lab in Pipestone was remodeled last year. Updated classroom with nursing stations, new manikins and simulation labs have a very interactive feel. Granite Falls and Worthington campuses have also seen recent remodels that were repurposed for capacity. Anyone interested in a one-on-one tour can contact Dawn Gordon. COVID 19 has presented some unique challenges. Students were able to complete Spring clinicals before COVID hit and were able to complete virtual simulations in March and April. Minnesota West College was awarded a Virtual Simulation Grant. This \$172,800 award will support student learning during COVID-19. Minnesota West was awarded the top ranked PN Program in MN – 4 <sup>th</sup> for 2020. Our Associate Degree program was awarded "Best Online Nursing Program" in 2020. Our nursing programs are both accredited with our next reviews in 2023 for the AS program and 2025 for the PN program.

	Center. They haven't had a significant rise in	n their community. Continued infection c	ontrol and use of masks, face shields,	

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and handwashing as not to get complacent. Leah Bittner, TVOC, said the increased use of technology and use of			
	meetings has been nice with people working remotely. Stressed critical thinking skills are important for nursing students.		
	Jessica Brouwer, Colonial Manor, agreed that technology has been great for staff meetings and also a great way for family to		
	meet with residents. Their facility has experienced shortages as supplies have ran out and changes to the admissions pro-		
	as they are limited on admits. Miranda Sharkey, Marshall Avera, said you can teach students everything they need to know,		
	however some students fail because they lack critical thinking. How do you teach that?		
Nursing Faculty Updates	Donna Hage said it's been good to be back in the classroom. Students have also been interacting via Zoom. Brenda		
	Pomerenke said her students are looking forward to clinicals. Amber Humphrey is the new PN instructor and has been		
	enjoying her new role. Labs are challenging as the students' social distance. Amber brings a positive attitude to her role. Kim		
	said she is finishing labs this week and looking forward to clinicals. Clinical placement will be in facilities and also using the		
	new simulation lab in Granite Falls.		
Additional Business/Discussion	Laurie Jo Johansen said their student numbers at SMSU have remained stable. She agreed that critical thinking isn't one module to teach, however it is woven thru out everything. They are looking at possible expanding their nursing program with a Master's degree. Ruth Van Heukelom said she was reading Nancy Ruth Leibold's critical thinking document. Nancy Ruth shared the link to her educational resource. She gave permission to share with workforce members.
